# United for Peace

The Mission and Outreach Committee of our Pastoral Charge invites you to participate in the *United for Peace Campaign* as one expression of our commitment to pursuing just peace with dignity for all God's people. The specific objective of this campaign is to raise two million dollars over two years that will be directed to peace initiatives around the world but focused especially on the conflict in the Holy Land.

In the Holy Land olive trees can live for 2,000 years and are considered sacred and a part of the families of

Palestine. Today an eight meter wall cuts Bethlehem off from Palestinian villages and olive groves are being destroyed to make room for Israeli settlements. The skilled artisans who once sold their products to pilgrims in Bethlehem have lost their incomes because of the conflict.

Palestinian and Israeli artisans have created United for Peace pins as a symbol of Arabs and Jews working together for peace. The pins are made by Palestinians from the olive-wood of the destroyed olive groves and Israelis make the fasteners.

Our Mission and Outreach Committee is making two items available to help raise funds for this campaign which runs from November 4, 2007, until December 31, 2009. The first is the pin which sells for \$20 (a portion is eligible as a charitable donation) and the second is a dove shaped cookie cutter which can be used to bake cookies for sale or be sold as tree ornaments.

As we begin our work on this campaign we welcome all support and ideas for raising funds for this important cause.

## Everything AND the Kitchen Sink

The Renovation Committee has spent the summer working with an architect and meeting with contractors for flooring, plumbing, heating and kitchen design. We have worked through revised quotes and ordered new appliances. With some changes to the blue prints we hope to be ready soon to acquire a renovation permit.

*Special thanks to Fred Myers for countless hours spent with the architects and to David Wilson who keeps us motivated and pushing ahead.*

Scheduling is a key issue and it looks like our contractors will be available to start demolition in January or February.

***"Remember that this is a No Debt Project so we will only undertake the parts of the project that are fully funded."***

### Phase One

Upgrades to water and electrical services, plumbing as well as insulation and flooring for washrooms and tower room are needed for safety, to help with energy efficiency and to guarantee potable water.

Renovations to the kitchen include an industrial dish washer, new plumbing, ovens and cupboards. These renovations will ensure that we meet Ministry of Health standards.

### Phase Two

Phase Two is about increasing efficiency and reducing operating costs. New energy efficient furnaces and hot water heater will translate into more dollars on hand every month.

### Phase Three

Undertaking a "No Debt" project means that most of the items in Phase Three must be put on hold. For exam-

ple, the wheel chair lift will be much more expensive than estimated. Feel free to ask members of the Renovation Committee any questions you have about the project.

# Our Walk Toward the Stable in 2008

These days there is a lot of talk about spirituality and what it means. One definition to ponder is this: 'finding the holy in the ordinary.' It seems ironical that people are searching for God while images and promises of God are all around us.

God has been described as a lioness and a mother hen, faith as a mustard seed, and eternal life as a flower. The Holy Spirit has been called Wind from ancient times, and our First Nations people recognize God's Spirit in every living being. When we look for God, even in the midst of the dark days of December it may be helpful to look to nature.

Although nature can seem harsh and cruel particularly in the winter season, it also offers images of hope. There are certain pine cones that will only open under the intense heat of a fire, and so what brings an end to the tree, brings

new life to the seed.

New birth in spring is followed by the growing season of summer. Autumn brings maturity and winter can appear to be desolate and without hope. And yet, beneath the blanket of snow, there is another spring waiting to be. And if you are open to its images, there is even hope in winter.

Every year birds and animals cope with winter as best they can. Some are lost, but most make it through. The wise ones accept help where it is offered and we delight in the sight of birds at our feeders. When the longest night of the year consumes us in December's darkness, we have only to wait another day to see the sunlight grow stronger and the days grow longer- hope in winter for a new spring to come. And while most of the trees have lost their leaves, the evergreen still has its colour under the blanket of snow. That's why the



evergreen has become a symbol of everlasting life.

So this winter let's look to creation for images of hope and signs of life. Let the lights of the advent candles, and even the tackiest of decorations remind us of the sun that will come again to warm the earth and encourage things to grow. Let the evergreen branches of our Christmas trees be a symbol of everlasting life. And let our gathering of family and friends remind us that Christ's love is at work bringing hope to our world.

The **Jingle Bell Tour** was a big hit in Pakenham on November 15th and 16th. Local businesses opened their doors to help one and all experience an old fashioned Christmas. We served 77 people on Saturday and 102 people on Sunday.

# The Jingle Bell Tour Recipes

*Many of you asked for the stew and cake recipes.  
Here they are with our compliments.*



## Jingle Bell Stew



### Ingredients

4 lbs	Stewing beef cut into 1" cubes
5 stalks	Celery
12	Carrots, halved lengthwise
4	Onions
6	Potatoes
2 – 10 oz cans	Tomato soup
1 soup can	Water or beef bouillon
2 tsp	Salt
1 tsp	Paprika
1 tsp	Pepper
1 tsp	Basil

### Method

- Preheat oven to 275°
- Place all ingredients in a large roast pan.
- Stir ingredients until well mixed.
- Bake for 3 to 4 hours.



### Notes

Thicken with flour or tapioca if needed.



## Moist Caramel Apple Cake

### Ingredients

1 Pkge	2-Layer no-name cake mix
1 Pkge (4 serving size)	Vanilla Instant Pudding
1 cup	Water
4	Large eggs
1/3 cup	Crisco oil
3 or 4	Spartan apples, peeled, coarsely chopped

### Method

- Preheat oven to 350°
- Spray large Bundt or angel cake pan with Pam.
- Beat cake mix, dry pudding mix, water, eggs and oil in large bowl with electric mixer on low until blended.
- Beat on high 2 more minutes.
- Gently stir in apples to completely blend.
- Pour into prepared pan.
- Bake 50-60 minutes or until a toothpick inserted in the centre comes out clean.
- Cool 20 minutes.
- Remove from pan and cool completely on a dinner plate on a wire rack.

### Notes

- Cake can be wrapped and frozen until needed.
- Serve at room temperature with warm caramel sauce.
- Serves about 14 depending on serving size.

## Warm Caramel Sauce

### Ingredients

1 cup	Dark brown sugar
4 Tbsp	Flour
2 cups	Water
1/2 cup	Butter
1 1/2 tsp	Vanilla

### Method

- In large saucepan, combine sugar and flour.
- Mix well.
- Slowly add water, whisking well to avoid lumps.
- Heat over medium-high heat, stirring constantly, until mixture comes to a boil and is thickened.
- Add butter and vanilla.
- Stir until butter is melted.

### Notes

- Use your gravy boat or a pretty bowl and ladle to serve warm sauce over cake.
- If you want a bit more just do 1 1/2 times the recipe.
